


















32		16x20	Leopard Frog	Watertown, New	A victim of a highway built next to a marsh, this leopard frog was found dead along a road in upper New York State. More than a million animals a day are killed along our nation's roads each and every day.





33		16x20	Central Newts and Southern Leopard Frog	Bennett Springs	Central newts prey on one of their favorite food sources, the eggs of southern leopard frogs.
34		16x20	Ozark Hellbender	St. Louis Zoo, St. Louis, Missouri	Chytrid fungus is responsible for this salamander's unusual appearance; the disease is almost always fatal, and causes victims to slough skin.
35		16x20	African Clawed Frog	Great Plains Zoo, St. Louis, Missouri	This species is native to the African Rift Valley, but were imported to the US and elsewhere for laboratory applications and the pet trade. They've since made their way into the wild, and are considered to be an invasive pest species in many parts of the world.
